but we can't keep living a sheltered life where we're all locked up in our rooms. At some point, we have to get out there and start living something approaching normal

life again.

Yuta: You didn't really answer my questions though.

Reina: I guess I didn't. Well, I suppose I am a bit worried. I've taken so many precautions

in the last couple of years to stay safe, so I don't really want to throw all of that out

Yuko: Ah. You obviously haven't heard yet. I'm going for a birthday drink with him before, but I can't go to the restaurant as I went vegetarian this year.

Ryo: Really? That's crazy! But you love eating meat? I couldn't believe how much you ate at the Brazilian barbecue place last year.

Yuko: Believe me, it's not because of the taste. No, it's something I've been thinking about for a while, and eventually this year I made a New Year's resolution to stop eating meat, and so far I've stuck to it.

Ryo: That seems a bit extreme. What brought the decision on then?

Yuko: Well, there are many reasons. Mainly, I'm doing it for myself and my peace of mind. The more I read about the connection between greenhouse gas emissions and cattle, the less I wanted to eat meat.

Ryo: Oh, come on! That's not going to do anything! Do you really think you're somehow going to save the world if you stop eating meat?

Yuko: Of course not. I'm not that naïve. I know that global challenges like climate change need to be tackled by governments and other institutions. Nevertheless, while it might not be up to me to solve the climate crisis, I believe in the phrase, 'Be the change you want to see in the world'. Also, I believe we have a responsibility to stay informed about issues connected to the planet.

Ryo: Well, I think you're looking at this all wrong. What about all the soy that vegetarians eat? I heard that a lot of the deforestation in South America was happening because farmers wanted to plant soybean fields.

Yuko: Actually, you're the one who's looking at this all wrong. You're right that deforestation is connected to farmers planting soybean crops. However, do you know why they're planting those soybean fields? To feed the cattle! So even the soybean deforestation is because of the world's demand for meat.

Ryo: OK, OK. I admire the passion, but I'm still going to the restaurant!

Yuko: That's fine by me. I'm not demanding anyone change things for me. I just want to live in accordance with my values.

If you're into action, fantasy, adventure stories or anything, there'll be something that interests you. Or if you're into more real world stories, there are more serious anime programs that deal with more adult themes like PTSD, mental illness or finding your purpose in life. Honestly, you really should give it a try.

Peter: That's interesting. I always thought animation was all about fighting, super heroes and other types of fantasy stuff for kids. I didn't realize there were deeper levels to it. You know what? Maybe I will come to the cinema with you this weekend. You've sparked my interest.

John: Excellent!

seem like enough of a reason for me.

Sota: There's nothing wrong with that. I had a similar reaction when I first heard about

the possibility of studying abroad. I even remember telling my parents I had no

interest in studying abroad.

Yukiko: Really? What made you say that?

Sota: Well first, they had never shown any interest in traveling abroad, so I thought it

was quite ( ) of them to suddenly want me to go. Also, I think I had always

told myself that I didn't want to work or live abroad, so what was the point of

studying abroad?

Yukiko: That's it! That's what my parents don't get. I've got nothing against the idea of

studying abroad, but I'm not sure if I want to spend a whole year away. I feel like

all I would be doing is putting my life here in Japan on hold.

Sota: I understand what you're saying, but I think you're looking at it in the wrong way.

My parents and teachers gave me the same information, about how companies in Japan looked very favorably on candidates who had studied abroad. But what

changed my mind was more than just better job opportunities. For me, it was

thinking about what kind of person I wanted to be. I realized that a lot of my

interests were global, and that if I wanted to have a global outlook on life, then

studying abroad could help with that.

Yukiko: That's interesting. So what you're saying is studying abroad can help broaden your

mind. Maybe I'll have another think about it. I don't want to be a cultural recluse,

but it's still a big decision.

Sota: That's true. It's definitely a decision worth taking your time with.

"You need more water," ①my next-door neighbor says decisively. We can both see clearly that the grass is greener, thicker and healthier-looking on his front yard, compared to mine. I have to admit that the manicured, evenly green lawn is nice; but I also know that the spring weather will quickly turn into dry summer heat, and that, to keep his lawn the envy of the neighborhood, he will need to turn his sprinkler on nearly every day and pay a \*hefty water bill for the rest of the summer. It all seems a bit excessive to me. So I compromise by watering my lawn just enough to keep it sort of green, with a few patches of brown here and there.

I have been told that it is very important for middle-class American homeowners to maintain the front appearance of their homes. In Southern California where I live, as well as many other regions of the United States, a green front lawn has traditionally been the most important element of presenting yourself as middle-class. It is annoying, however, how much work it takes to maintain it. It must be watered properly and trimmed regularly during the long, growing season; no matter how careful you are, the water bill skyrockets during the hottest months. In the wintertime, the lawn needs to be fertilized, \*raked and reseeded. If you don't do everything right, it will turn brown and die and weeds will take over. The most problematic part of all this is water. In this dry region, every square foot of lush green equals gallons and gallons of water, sprinkled and poured all over our yards.

②"That's got to stop" is the message we have been getting for quite a while. Because of the effects of climate change, we have been under extreme drought conditions for the last two decades. Restrictions have been imposed during many summers to lower outdoor water usage. This inevitably leads to dry, brown lawns.

The lush green expanse of the front lawn makes affluent Southern-California neighborhoods a \*mesmerizing vision to see. It is the embodiment of the American Dream. But the extended drought conditions have reminded us of the ( ) of this dream. Everyone knows by now that it is not sustainable any longer to waste water — one of the most precious resources in our region with its ever-growing population.

At the same time, I see people resisting the change. To me, the idea of having a lawn that's perfectly green all the time seems like an unrealistic <u>③extravagance</u>; but for those who grew up with it, what dies in the prolonged drought is not just the grass on their front yard, but people's very way of life, which has taken vast amounts of time, care and money to maintain.

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California announced that homeowners can only water their outdoor areas once a week. While my own city, situated further inland and dependent on different water sources, was not affected by this decision, it is only a matter of time before we, too, will see some sort of restrictions this summer.

My next-door neighbor is already upset by the possibility of having to let his lawn die in the summer heat and contemplates aloud whether it is worth the risk to continue watering his lawn as he sees necessary. Another neighbor just replaced their lawn with \*artificial turf, which will require no watering or maintenance for years to come. In a similar way, one of my friends has already started growing drought-resistant plants in her yard as they don't need much water at all, and recommends that I do the same.

Artificial turf and sustainable landscaping both have merits and are easier to maintain than traditional lawns. But I'm still sitting on the fence, because, as a token of my uncertain attempt to be part of middle-class Californian life, nothing seems quite as fitting as the sort of green lawn that graces the front of my home. We'll see how much longer I can wait before making a decision this summer.
